RGV Sector Interim Guidance on Enhanced Amenities for Border Patrol Detainees

Effective August 22, 2019, RGV Sector is implementing additional amenities for Border Patrol detainees. This guidance applies to all RGV Sector stations. Agents are responsible for tracking amenities in the e3 Detention Module consistent with existing guidance.

The following instruction is to be implemented concurrently by all RGV Stations with applicable CBP National Standards on Transport, Escort, Search and Detention (TEDS.), to include, but not be limited to Sections: 4.2 At-Risk Detainee Determination Process; 4.3 General Detention Procedures; 4.5 Electronic System(s) of Record; 4.6 Hold Room Monitoring; 4.13 Food and Beverage, and; 4.14 Drinking Water. The instruction must be integrated into the execution of T.E.D.S. Sections: 5.0 (At-Risk Populations); 5.1 (General); 5.2 (UAC Screening) 5.3 (Documentation); 5.6 (Detention), and; 6.0 (Sexual Abuse Victimization).

For Adult Detainees:

Upon arrival to a detention location, or as soon as is operationally feasible, adult detainees must:

- Undergo a medical screening
- Be screened for "at-risk" detainee determination
- Be separated by gender
- Be assigned to a detention location (cell) via intake process
- Be provided a snack (to include food and water)
- Be provided a Mylar blanket (repeat daily at breakfast)
- Be provided a sleeping mat (if operationally feasible)
- Be provided a toothbrush (repeat daily at breakfast)
- Be provided personal cleansing wipes (repeat daily at breakfast)

At <u>72</u> hours in detention, or soon as is operationally feasible after <u>72</u> hours, adult detainees must be provided with:

- An offer to make an outgoing telephone call.* If a detainee requests to make an outgoing telephone call prior to the 72-hour mark, agents retain the discretion to accommodate such a request if operationally feasible.
- Access to shower/bathe*
- A sleeping mat for at least 8 hours per day if the subject was not previously provided a sleeping mat at intake*

*Actions will be repeated every <u>72</u> hours that the adult detainee remains in custody, as is operationally feasible.

Continuing Services for Adult Detainees:

• Adult detainees must be provided with <u>3</u> regularly scheduled meals per day – with at least <u>one</u> hot meal per day.

- Adult detainees must be provided with snacks and drinks between regularly scheduled meals, and may be provided with additional snacks outside of normal food service times, based on the circumstances of the request.
- Adult detainees must have continuous access to clean drinking water.

**Pregnant adult female detainees are subject to juvenile detention standards. (Refer to TEDS Section 5.6)

For Juvenile Detainees:

Upon arrival to a detention location, or as soon as is operationally feasible, juvenile detainees must:

- Undergo a medical screening
- Be screened for "at-risk" detainee determination and for unaccompanied alien child (UAC) status
- Be separated from unrelated adults or detained with related family members, as appropriate
- Be separated by gender, as appropriate
- Be assigned to a detention location (cell) via intake process
- Be provided a snack (to include food and water)
- Be provided a Mylar blanket (repeat daily at breakfast)
- Be provided a sleeping mat (if operationally feasible)
- Be provided a toothbrush (repeat daily at breakfast)
- Be provided personal cleansing wipes (repeat daily at breakfast)

At/after <u>48</u> hours in detention, or soon as is operationally feasible after <u>48</u> hours, juvenile detainees must be provided with:

• Access to shower/bathe*

*Action will be repeated every <u>48</u> hours that the juvenile detainee remains in custody, as is operationally feasible

At <u>72</u> hours in detention, or soon as is operationally feasible, juvenile detainees must be provided with:

- A sleeping mat for at least 8 hours per day if the subject was not previously provided a sleeping mat at intake*
- An offer to make an outgoing telephone call.* If a detainee requests to make an outgoing telephone call prior to the 72-hour mark, agents retain the discretion to accommodate such a request if operationally feasible.
- Transfer to the custody of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) if determined to be a UAC

*Actions will be repeated every <u>72</u> hours that the juvenile detainee remains in custody, as mandated by the I-770 and as is operationally feasible.

Continuing Services for Juvenile Detainees:

- Juvenile detainees must be provided with a snack and drink upon arrival, and meals every <u>6</u> hours with at least <u>two</u> hot meals per day.
- Juvenile detainees must be provided with regular access to snacks and drinks.
- Juvenile detainees must have continuous access to clean drinking water.
- When available, juvenile detainees will be provided with clean, dry clothing.
